Synopsis

Students will learn the basics of the operation, safety, driving techniques, and other related components of the professional driver occupation. Students will also learn about the career and how to obtain a professional Class 1 License. This course will promote independent thinking and problem solving.

Rationale

Not only is being a professional truck driver a great profession, but there is a massive demand for this highly-skilled occupation. A 2013 Conference Board of Canada report concludes that the age of the average truck driver has increased more rapidly than the age of the average worker due to fewer young workers entering the industry. At the same time, demand for trucking services is projected to increase. By 2020, the gap between supply and demand of drivers is projected to be between 25,000 and 30,000 nationwide. In BC, the gap is anticipated to be between 2,200 and 4,500 depending on the strength of the economy. Because trucking plays an integral service role for so many industries, insufficient supply of truck drivers could have significant negative economic implications for the Canadian economy.

Unit 2 – Basic Driving Skills

Objective: Students will obtain the basic driving skills and knowledge relating to the operation of a commercial vehicle.

Curriculum Organizer:

It is expected that students will learn:

- Learn how to start a truck
- How to use a clutch
- How to shift gears
- How to drive a truck forward
- How to reverse a truck
- How to steer a truck into turns
- How to be seen and using your mirrors

Prescribed Learning Outcomes

It is expected that students will:

- Demonstrate how to start and turn off a truck
- Demonstrate how to shift gears effectively and at appropriate RPMs
- Demonstrate how to use a clutch and techniques such as double-clutching
- Understand the importance of using their mirrors
- Understand proper lane use and demonstrate which lane to use at appropriate times
- Demonstrate how to maneuver the truck including steering into turns, wheel position and turning radius
- Demonstrate the basic principles of backing up a truck with and without a guide

Unit 3 – Truck Systems Part 1

Objective: Students will learn the capacities of tractor-trailer systems.

Curriculum Organizer:

It is expected that students will learn:

- Specific characteristics of trucks
- Engine capabilities
- Transmission systems

Prescribed Learning Outcomes

It is expected students will:

1. Be able to differentiate between makes and models of trucks and trailers and their characteristics
2. Be able to locate and understand the functions of indicators and switches on a dashboard
3. Learn about diesel engines including:

Assessment Component

Obtaining a License - 10%

Although 50% is a passing grade for high school credit, entrance to the Commercial Truck Driver Program will require 70% and successful screening.
